60 Years of Global Solutions

While Citizens for Global Solutions was formally created three years ago, its legacy dates back to 1947. Sixty years ago, in the wake of World War II, 327 delegates representing 30 chapters and organizations from across the nation met in Asheville, North Carolina and founded the United World Federalists (UWF).

Those who came to Asheville traveled through one of the worst snowstorms of the century, urged on, in the words of founder and current Citizens for Global Solutions board member Ed Rawson, “by the conviction that peace is not merely the absence of war, but the presence of justice and law under a democratic system of governance that all nations should live by.”

Rawson said that the delegates lived through “an era that saw men, women and children slaughtered en masse through mechanized warfare, genocidal intent and nuclear destruction.” He and others in Asheville “felt committed to playing an active role in the birth of an organization that would fight for universal justice and equality not only for me and my contemporaries, but also for those who follow us.”

For Rawson, and thousands of others, the ideals that were born in Asheville 60 years ago continue to live on today at Citizens

for Global Solutions. He and his fellow pioneers were part of a global movement that sought to replace the “law of force with the force of law.” Also in 1947, representatives from 21 nations, including the U.S., met in Montreux, Switzerland to found an international organization that brought together national groups working for world federation. Now called the World Federalist Movement, in 1947 the groups declared that: “We are convinced that mankind cannot survive another world conflict.”

In the U.S., the young organization had a great deal of energy and support behind it. By 1949 it had more than 40,000 members. Its advisory board included three governors, the president of the United Auto Workers, the chairman of Standard Oil of Ohio and renowned figures including Albert Einstein, Oscar Hammerstein and Kurt Vonnegut. Twenty three state legislatures passed bills supporting the organization’s goals. Resolutions were introduced in Congress that called for a strengthened United Nations with “defined and limited powers as essential to the enactment, interpretation, and enforcement of world law to prevent aggression and to maintain peace.”

However, the advent of the Cold War and McCarthyism signaled the demise of many organizations with international ties.

Veteran member Ray Short said that “our chapters were scared for their lives” and that high profile members resigned “in fear of McCarthy ruining their careers.”

Scott Hoffman, director of the World Federalist Institute, an internal Citizens for Global Solutions “think tank” that was established in 2004 to carry on the tradition of studying world federalism, notes that despite the loss of momentum during the McCarthy era, the organization recognized that many incremental steps could still be achieved. He said that global cooperation was still needed to address the underlying problems that motivated the organization’s members – war, poverty and environmental degradation brought on the inability of individual nation states to govern an increasingly interconnected world.

Citizens for Global Solutions is still engaged in many of the successful efforts initiated by UWF. In the 1960’s UWF developed legislation, championed by Senator Hubert Humphrey, which created the Arms Control and Disarmament Agency. The organization was also an early supporter of the Comprehensive Test Ban Treaty and the Nuclear Non-Proliferation Treaty. It worked with other organizations to establish a U.S. Department of Peace, which eventually

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Leon Panetta

Joint Ocean Commission Initiative

A former Member of the House of Representatives, Director of the Office of Management and Budget and Chief of Staff to President Bill Clinton, Leon Panetta has recently turned his attention to one of his great passions: management of the world's vast oceans. Panetta now Co-Chairs the Joint Ocean Commission Initiative (JOCI), a key partner of Citizens for Global Solutions in the push to ratify the U.N. Convention on the Law of the Sea (LOS). Panetta recently agreed to be interviewed for *Global Solutions Quarterly*.

The Joint Ocean Commission Initiative has been a driving force behind the effort to get the U.S. to ratify the Law of the Sea. Could you explain to our readers how the Joint Initiative was formed and what you do?

We started out as two separate Commissions. I chaired the independent Pew Oceans Commission, which released its report in 2003. One year later, the congressionally-mandated and presidentially-appointed U.S. Commission on Ocean Policy, chaired by Admiral James Watkins (Ret.), released its report. Both reports focused on changes in policies necessary to improve national and global stewardship of oceans and coasts. In the final analysis, there was a lot of overlap in the recommendations of the two reports. Everyone agrees that we need to incorporate into U.S. policy better ecosystem-based management, ocean governance, fisheries management and increased reliance on science in management decisions. Following the release of the two reports, Admiral Watkins and I both realized that the successful implementation of the report recommendations would require continued effort by the members of the two Commissions, thus we established the Joint Ocean Commission Initiative, which includes the full membership of both Commissions.

How does the Law of the Sea convention fit into JOCI's agenda?

Admiral Watkins, the Commissioners and I all believe that oceans and coasts are severely threatened, domestically and around the world. On a basic, intuitive level, it simply makes sense. No one nation can set the rules for use and navigation of the oceans. Additionally, we believe we need the legal protections and economic opportunities that the Law of the Sea would afford us. We need a set of fair standards that all countries agree to meet, and the Law of the Sea convention is exactly that.

Do you think joining the Law of the Sea would have an effect on the United States' standing in the world?

Absolutely. There's a perception internationally that Americans don't like international institutions, that Americans view treaties and international law as constraints on their power. You and I know that most Americans don't feel that way. Most Americans want their government to work hand-in-hand with other governments to solve global problems that can't be solved by an individual country. And most people here want us to be seen as a country that is admired and respected. For some of our partners abroad, our failure to ratify this treaty, which offers us so many substantial benefits at no cost, have begun to question whether we are as committed to international law as we say we are. In addition to the national security, environmental and economic benefits it would provide, ratifying the Law of the Sea would also help us strengthen our global alliances.

Let's talk about some of those benefits. The supporter base for the Law of the Sea typifies an "odd bedfellows" coalition. In your view, why are such diverse groups supporting this treaty?

There's something for everybody in the Law of the Sea. President Bush and the military desperately want to join so our navigational

rights and national security interests can be protected,

while peace groups see it as a way to settle disputes absent the threat of force. American oil and gas companies understand that until we ratify, their foreign competitors will have a leg up on them; at the same time, environmental groups see participation in Law of the Sea as the only way to conserve a fragile marine environment and marine resources on the high seas. It's really amazing to consider how one treaty advances our interests in so many ways.

Plus, I think we all recognize that it's better not to sit on the sidelines when it comes to international institutions. We are always better served by being a constructive participant in international negotiations that impact our national interests, rather than pretending the debate isn't happening. That's what the treaty's few opponents seem to want us to do.

This treaty has been around for a long time. Do you think the Senate will vote to accede to it?

I do. I've seen this treaty get bottled up for years, but I think the time has come. We're living in an increasingly interconnected world. The Russian activities in the Arctic, the challenge of stopping the proliferation of weapons of mass destruction and the threats to migratory fish stocks have substantially raised the profile of the Law of the Sea. This treaty now has broad bipartisan support, including that of President Bush. This is not about Republican or Democrat, left or right. It is fundamentally about the sustainability of our world and the security and economic interests of our country. 155 countries around the world understand the importance of the treaty. Ratification is a practical step that the U.S. is soon going to take, at long last. ●



Leadership Change at the Organization

After three years as the President and CEO of Citizens for Global Solutions, Charles J. Brown informed the organization's board of directors that he was resigning, effective at the end of September 2007.

Upon accepting Brown's resignation, the board appointed Raj Purohit, who has served as Senior Fellow for the past two years, as the organization's Interim Director. The board also announced that they are working together to set out the criteria for the selection of a permanent leader for the organization.

"We deeply appreciate all that Charlie has accomplished during the past three years and we know that all of our members join us in wishing him well as he pursues new challenges," said Chairs of the Citizens for Global Solutions' boards Marjorie Ramp and Donald Ferencz.

Brown, who recently became a father for the first time, said "It has been a privilege serving as your President, following in the footsteps of such extraordinary leaders as Norman Cousins and John Anderson. The opportunities I have had to work with so

many of you over my tenure will remain among my most valued and cherished memories."

The board chairs noted the phenomenal accomplishments of Citizens for Global Solutions during Brown's tenure as the organization's President and CEO. They specifically noted the work of the organization's members and staff on core issues of importance ranging from the International Criminal Court to the United Nations and genocide in Darfur.

"Thanks to our members' work and that of our terrific staff, we were able to repel the Bush administration's attacks on the International Criminal Court (ICC), in the process helping put a stop to the administration's efforts to penalize those countries who have joined the ICC. We have helped convince key officials that it is in America's best interests to start working with the ICC to bring an end to the genocide in Darfur.

"We also worked with partner organizations to defeat the unilateralist campaign against the United Nations, preventing their efforts to cut U.N. dues – and in the

very near future – to end the cap on peace-keeping dues. We continue to work with our partners and friends to promote the bold concept of the international community's Responsibility to Protect those at risk of mass atrocities. In these and other ways, Citizens for Global Solutions has worked to make the U.N. the effective and capable institution we need to respond to the threats and challenges of a new century," Ramp and Ferencz said.

The board chairs also noted the organization's work to connect the global to local in cities like Indianapolis, Des Moines, Santa Fe, Pittsburgh and Minneapolis. In these communities the organization has helped build local coalitions of activists, giving them the skills they need to talk about global issues in their hometowns. For example, earlier this year, Citizens for Global Solutions worked closely with the Darfur divestment campaign in Indiana.

"We are beginning to help local activists have an impact not only at home, but around the world as well," they said. 🌍

resulted in the creation of the United States Institute of Peace. According to Hoffman, "the very fact that there has not been a nuclear holocaust or a third world war is an indication of how successful our efforts have been. Sixty years after our founding, the world has a web of international institutions and laws for the first time in the history of our species. Of course the need for effective and empowered global institutions is even more acute now than it was at our founding."

In 1975, primarily because of changing tax laws, the organization divided into an educational, tax-deductible organization, the World Federalist Association (WFA), and a political association, the Campaign for United Nations Reform (CUNR). They worked as sister organizations with WFA developing programs and CUNR

supporting them politically with PAC contributions and congressional scorecards.

Throughout the 1970's WFA actively supported negotiations to create the Law of the Sea Treaty, which was adopted in 1981 and is expected to finally be voted on by the Senate this year. In the late 1980's and 1990's WFA was a leading supporter of a treaty to create an International Criminal Court (ICC), culminating in the creation of the treaty in Rome in August 1998, where World Federalists played a key leadership role in organizing backing for the ICC.

In the mid-90's WFA and CUNR were key players in efforts to keep the United States, which had accrued a \$1 billion debt to the United Nations, engaged in international institutions. A petition campaign launched by WFA generated a thank you letter from then President

Clinton, who said "We need an effective U.N. in order to address the dilemmas of the post-Cold War global landscape, and I am confident that we can bring about an era of unprecedented success that is consistent with the goals of the U.N.'s founders."

In 2004 the World Federalist Association merged with the Campaign for U.N. Reform to become Citizens for Global Solutions. The merger has been very successful. In just three years, we have been able to address a broad array of global solutions, attract more supporters and increase our access to funders and our political clout. Sixty years from now let's hope we can look back at the very significant role our organization played towards building peace, justice and freedom in a democratically governed world. 🌍

Annual Meeting in Minneapolis

The Citizens for Global Solutions 2007 Annual Meeting will take place October 26–28 in Minneapolis, MN, at the University of Minnesota's Hubert H. Humphrey Institute of Public Affairs. This year's theme, "Steps on the Road to a Just and Enduring Peace," will look at what the United States and the United Nations must do over the next several decades to tackle global challenges and build a sustainable peace.

The 2007 Annual Meeting will provide an opportunity for long-time members of Citizens for Global Solutions to revisit the organization's unique vision to build peace, justice and freedom in a democratically governed world. The meeting will also be an opportunity to introduce new members to our mission.

The weekend event will explore key improvements in U.N. procedures – such as weighted

voting in the General Assembly and Security Council, the necessity of bringing the global south into a genuinely lasting peace and the strengthening of international institutions like the International Criminal Court (ICC), the Nuclear Non-Proliferation Treaty (NPT) and U.N. peacemaking forces. It will also examine the key threats and challenges that we face and evaluate potential solutions to these issues. A focus on these cornerstone issues of our interconnected world promises to make the 2007 Annual Meeting a critical arena for new and old members to come together in the pursuit of these ideals.

The meeting coincides with a unique moment in history, where world leaders increasingly recognize the importance of international cooperation. To that end, Citizens for Global Solutions is renewing its commitment to turn *motivation* for a just and enduring peace into the *initiative* that will make this a reality.

Events at this year's meeting will include a seated dinner in honor of a long-time member and supporter, an evening of film and the following sessions:

Weighted Voting at the United Nations: What is it? How could it be implemented? Can it achieve the essential goal of giving the U.N. authority to create binding international laws? Can it be utilized as a tool to further democratize the U.N. and ensure that decisions more accurately reflect the changing demographics of our interconnected world?

Building Just and Lasting Peace from a Global South Perspective: What are the key peace and security issues that matter for citizens of the Global South? Do they believe the issues most important to them are being adequately addressed by the western powers? What can be done to ensure that priority global issues reflect concerns across the entire international community?

ICC & UNEPS: From Darfur to Congo, the need for a strong international justice mechanism coupled with an established U.N. emergency peacekeeping force is clear. What needs to be done to ensure that the international community remains committed to strengthening both the ICC and UNEPS?

Thinking Ahead: What will the world look like in 2057 (50 years from now)? What are the most urgent global problems to get under control by then? What global structures, especially at the U.N., are essential for trying to solve these problems? What should the United States do to facilitate creating these structures?

Creating a Nuclear Weapons-Free World: Since its inception in 1968 the Non-Proliferation Treaty has played a key role in global security by limiting the spread of nuclear weapons. Recently, however, countries inside and outside the NPT have sought nuclear technology for energy purposes or to gain political clout, and promises made by signatories are not being kept. How can we bolster the non-proliferation regime to meet the challenges of the 21st century? How can we compel the nuclear weapons states to fulfill their promises of disarmament? ●

Book Club Engages Activists

Citizens for Global Solutions recently launched its first online book club. Closely linked with our organization's End Torture Campaign, this new outreach initiative allowed some of our most engaged activists to participate in a discussion about U.S. interrogation policy and torture as practiced under the Bush administration.

The subject of our discussion was the book "American Torture," by New York-based author Michael Otterman. Otterman is an award-winning documentary filmmaker and freelance journalist. He currently serves as Visiting Scholar at the Centre for Peace and Conflict Studies at the University of Sydney, Australia.

His book is an eye-opening account of how the CIA has developed and refined its policy of "coercive interrogation" from the end of World War II until the present day. The book is meticulously researched and deeply instructive. It details how these various interrogation practices have been crudely perfected at huge cost to human life and dignity, while being totally approved by the U.S. government.

While we are taught to believe the fabled axiom that there is traditionally a line drawn between the good guys and the bad, "American Torture" blurs the line and muddies the waters between these two polar opposites. Otterman commandingly demonstrates how the Bush administration's modern torture policies have severely damaged our nation's reputation and ability to lead responsibly.

For the book club, we created an online forum on our "Connecting Global to Local" website. This allowed registrants to login and create a profile, in order to discuss the book with other participants. The forum was specifically designed to facilitate a dynamic online conversation between users. It allowed registrants to post comments, ask questions and on a more intrinsic level enabled them to network with likeminded individuals.

The online book club served as the initial component in an ambitious effort to take Citizens for Global Solutions' vision and mission to a broader audience. To bolster our online efforts, we coordinated a book tour with Otterman in mid-September, targeting

three specific cities – Albuquerque, Santa Fe and San Diego.

The tour was full, with multiple events held over the course of a week. They were held at a variety of venues, including the University of New Mexico School of Law and Webster University in Albuquerque. There were also back-to-back events at the College of Santa Fe and Collected Works Bookstore, which has been voted the best bookstore in New Mexico.

While the online book club created an initial buzz around "American Torture," the tour through New Mexico and southern California offered an exciting opportunity for Citizens for Global Solutions to take to the road with a published author and engage in some good old fashioned grassroots outreach. Furthermore, by engaging local communities around the issue of torture and rendition, we have been able to connect our vision and mission to new audiences while engaging our long-term supporters in the region. 🌐
